#### PASTOR'S POST - IN CHRIST ALONE (10-23-16)

Grace and peace to you and yours from God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit!



For over 2000 years orthodox Christians have affirmed the principle of "Solus Christus" or "Christ alone." The Reformation period, 500 years ago, was a time when the reformers like Martin Luther believed they were called upon to make this confession anew.

This was primarily because of the medieval Roman Catholic understanding of "penance." This was the idea that in order for God's forgiveness to be effective in the life of the repenting person that person had to do something to show they were serious, some good work, some kind of amends. Even though the words of forgiveness (absolution) may have been pronounced by the priest or pastor, that forgiveness was a "conditional forgiveness" because it depended on the Christian then following up and doing something to make it good. After all what would you do and how would you know when you have done enough?

While it might make sense for us to understand forgiveness this conditional way, Luther and the reformers rejected it for a couple of reasons. One is that <u>nowhere</u> in Scripture does God tell us that when we confess our sins to Him the forgiveness He offers will only be good if we do

something else. The Gospel for this Sunday from Luke18 makes this point unequivocally. Two men go into the temple to pray. One thanks God for being a devout person. The other stands far off in the distance and says simply, "God, be merciful to me a sinner." Jesus says that the man who sought God's mercy went home justified (Luke 18:14). No contingencies. Nothing more to be done. He is forgiven.

What is more to the point, if all the forgiveness we receive from God is conditioned upon us doing something more, then we are actually saying that what Jesus did for us on the cross, just wasn't enough! His rejection, humiliation, torture, suffering and

suffer enough on the cross, or die enough for the forgiveness of my sins?

Certainly it is true that we ask that God change our hearts, realizing that we have hurt others or failed to be faithful to God. But that is not a condition of God's free and full forgiveness of sins.

death his death were all insufficient for full and free forgiveness. Does a believer rally think that Jesus didn't

Imagine you go to worship one Sunday and that pastor announces the Absolution by saying something like, "I forgive you all your sins, <u>provided</u> that you go and make amends to all the people against whom you have sinned." It certainly may be true that the forgiveness I give to people can be contingent. But that is the difference between you and me, and the God who loves us, forgives us, and calls us to live in the joy and freedom of the Gospel. **God forgives unconditionally!** Not so much for people.

Such forgiveness is possible only because of Jesus Christ. That is why Lutherans and all faithful Christians affirm the *Solus Christus*. As the song we'll sing Sunday reminds us, "In Christ alone my hope is found."

Southern Baptist scholar Stephen J. Wellum has written a nice summary of how the "solas" we have been discussing all fit together: "The word spoken by God, the faith given by God, the grace extended by God, and the glory possessed and promised *Solus Christus* cannot make sense apart from the divine Son who assumed our humanity for our salvation. Five centuries later it is indeed still all about Jesus!



- Callie Santora helped design the trifold pamphlet which Donna delivered to Zion, Peace, Beautiful Savior, Immanual.
- Email notices went to the pastors/churches in the circuit and Grace Lutheran. An announcement was in the Gazette Times religion section the day before the event. Attendees totaled 37 from six churches (Shepherd of the Valley (25), Peace, Immanual, Zion, Grace, Peace Salem).
- A light dinner (soup, salad, rolls, cookies) was catered by Karen Fruetel of AbFab Catering.
- A Thrivent Action Fund grant of \$250 and a free will offering of \$213 helped to defray the costs of the meal.
- Shepherd of the Valley Church Council committed to providing the remaining portion of \$237 from church funds at its September meeting.

## SHEPHERD OF THE VALLEY LUTHERAN CHURCH, CORVALLIS, OREGON IIP REPORT FOR CHURCH COUNCIL – 10/12/2016

**Transition Team** has completed its work and the self-study has been emailed to the district office 10/12. Thanks again to those who served with me on the team: Bill Randall, Jennifer Klammer, Nichole Havranek, Katy Trautman, Jay McDougal, & Rob Durbin and myself. Bill Randall made a presentation for the team at the Cross+Gen Sunday School class on September 25. Transition Team highly recommends a meeting with Call Committee once installed to review the self-study document.

Campus ministry at OSU: Luther House Sunday was October 9. Pastor Jim Norlie (campus pastor) made a presentation during Cross+Gen Sunday School that day. Pastor's recommendations: appoint or elect an MTL for campus ministry. Invite those who would like to support Luther House to join in buying a table(s) at the February 2017 Luther Fest benefit. Continue to partner with Luther House as appropriate.

**Elders:** discussed opening assisting ministers to communion to more members. Pastor's recommendations: "de-genderize" the discussion about communion assistants. The gender of the person is irrelevant so long as that person is a voting member in

good standing and has been trained. What we are asking to do that is different is opening the opportunity to serve as assisting ministers at Holy Communion to <u>all</u> voting members of the congregation who are in good standing and who agree to be trained to serve in this important ministry of the church, and not just to women who meet those qualifications. SVLC By-Law 4.2 restricts women from holding only two offices: elder and president. The ministry of serving as a communion assistant is not "distinctive to the public exercise of the ministry of Word and Sacrament" as the pastor himself is serving that function at Holy Communion. Only the pastor is elected to exercise the public ministry of Word and Sacrament. I know of nothing in Scripture prohibiting any voting member who is appropriately trained from serving.

**Worship & Prayer:** Downloadable version of "Now the Feast and Celebration," a contemporary communion liturgy by Marty Haugen was ordered and it is being used for Sunday worship. It was taught to the congregation during Cross+Gen Sunday School October 2. Well received.

**Biblical Equipping:** at least one new small group came out of "Growth Group" month. Topics for Cross+Gen Sunday School have been listed in the Shepherd's Voice through November 20. Completed the Genesis series September 18. Fellowship Bible Study continues to meet on Mondays 10:00-11:30 AM to study the texts for the following Sunday. Dr. Gary Ferngren, distinguished professor of history at OSU will be guest speaker for Cross+Gen Sunday School on Reformation Sunday 10/30.

**Missional Service/Outreach:** final 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration event is November 6. Pastor Jeff Ries has gained approval to serve as our guest preacher for the All Saints Sunday service that day. He requests only mileage reimbursement at IRS rate for his travel to/from his home (about 460 miles)


