PASTOR'S POST: Repent? For What?

December 11, 2016



This time of year the church turns the attention of believers to the ministry of John the Baptist, the voice crying in the wilderness, "Prepare the way of the Lord!" The reasons why John the Baptist is important aren't always self-apparent. He's mostly known for his austere life style, for wearing clothing that even the people at St. Vinnie's probably wouldn't touch, and for having a diet that was certainly different. Safe to say, I do not think such will be the fare offered during our fellowship times at Shepherd of the Valley.

But to focus on what we might call the "weirdness" of John is to miss the point. John shows up in all four Gospel readings as the one preparing the way of Jesus. When Jesus begins his ministry of teaching preaching and healing, he begins by submitting the John's baptism "to fulfill all righteousness." Clearly John must have been important to the first apostles and the early Christian. But why? Is he more than an anachronism, a relic from Bible days with no relevance to us?

What makes John the Baptist worth serious consideration for Christians today is our context. We are trying to be the church in a time when many if not most churches in this country are in decline, including our own. One study showed 4,000 churches a year

close their doors forever. This is mirrored by the experience at Shepherd of the Valley where worship attendance has dropped from over 201 to about 60 over the past dozen or so years. Another study showed that 2.7 million church members in America become inactive and quit going to church every year. Apparently a lot of people just don't see the point of being "churched" any more, and that raises many problems for congregations like Shepherd of the Valley.

Can we learn anything about being God's church today from John the Baptist? One thing might be that John had clarity about who he was and what his purpose was. He knew that he had been sent by God to "prepare the way" for the One who was to come, i.e. Jesus. This means John knew he was not the One. His purpose was to point people to the One long promised, who would baptize them with the Holy Spirit. His oft heard message, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand," invited people into a new and vibrant relationship with God. That's what "repent" means: to set out on a new orientation in life with a new set of priorities.

Maybe part of the reason we see such loses in our churches is that many believers today lack the kind of clarity of identity and purpose that John had. It is common for church folk to play the blame game: the problem is the district president, or the pastor, or the lay leadership – clearly someone else is doing something wrong, and that is what's causing this mass desertion we are experiencing all over the church.

Doubtless pastors and leadership can always be doing things better. But at the end of his parables of the lost (Luke 15) Jesus said, "Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance." Not many people these days are seriously asking themselves, "What do I need to change about me to serve my Lord better?"

The ministry of John the Baptist centers on God's call to think seriously about our repentance. "Repent for what?" we might ask. Perhaps we have stopped urgently pointing people to Jesus, like John did. We have learned too well the devil's lesson to not talk about religion because it only gets people upset. Might we need a lesson on how to be contemporary John the Baptists? What if all believers clearly really saw their divine purpose as one of pointing people to Jesus as God's Christ? God's mission is not about the church, and its demographic circumstances, it is about people who need to know and live in a new relationship with God in Christ. How can we "prepare the way" for the One?

Blessed is the One who comes in the Name of the Lord!


