6th Sunday after Epiphany - Senior Servants Sunday - February 12, 2017

At Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church we have some of the best old folks you will could want to meet. It's true we don't have many children or young people around. Hearing a baby cry in a church service is a welcome sound for us. Many people think

that having young families with school age children in the church service is THE indicator of a particular vitality in the life of their church. Well, it is one sign of vitality. But it's not the only one. **Having a lively crew of seniors can be equally joyful and a sign of church vitality too.**

And it better be, because none of us is getting any younger. What is more we old folks (I include myself) don't have to pretend about life any more. We all know that none of us is getting out of this life alive. Death is the "real deal." We don't have endless tomorrows to "get real" about life or finally do what we need to do in life. We don't have time to live in denial, and pretend that having the newest techno widget is going to make life really meaningful. 

SHEPHERD OF THE VALLEY TO BEGIN READING MATTHEW-THE GOSPEL OF IDENTITY



Have you ever actually read through a whole Gospel, maybe at one sitting? There are four stories of Jesus in the New Testament, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Have you ever read one from beginning to end? That is the challenge the Biblical Equipping Team is putting before everyone in our church starting this Sunday. We are challenged to read the Gospel of Matthew. Here's why.

In our worship we get "snap shots" of the life, sayings, and ministry of our Lord Jesus. Every Sunday we stand up to hear "the Gospel" for the day being read. As a result we have in our minds perhaps a series of disconnected events. It's rather like looking at a photo album. We see the individual scenes, but we don't necessarily understand how they are connected.

This is especially true of newer people in the Christian life. Fewer and fewer people who to come to the Christian life and attend worship have read much of the Bible, and probably not a whole Gospel. But in fact the Gospels are narratives, they are more like a movie than an album of snap shots. The individual scenes are connected, and as has been said "the whole is greater than the sum of its parts." There

is a story in the Gospels that invites us to not just know about Jesus, but to really know Jesus.

Matthew invites us to know Jesus in a particular way: as the one who calls us to discipleship, that is, to be followers of Jesus in our lives. Matthew begins and ends with invitations to discipleship. In the beginning Jesus calls Peter, Andrew, James, and John to leave their fishing nets and follow him as he makes his way along the shore of the Sea of Galilee. And later in a surprise that would have stunned the others, Jesus calls Levi (later Matthew) a tax collector – a traitor to his people and a collaborator with their oppressors. At the conclusion Jesus commissions the disciples to likewise "go therefore and make disciples." So as we read God's Word through his servant Matthew we pray that we will be discovering God's call to each of us to "follow Jesus." Because that's Matthew's and our new identity – we are disciples of Jesus today.

Matthew, The Gospel of Identity (above) by Michael Card will be the primary resource for our upcoming study of the Gospel of Matthew starting February 12 in our Multi-Gen Sunday School class led by Pastor Joe on Sundays 10:30-11:30 AM. Michael Card's book helps us to understand the connected narrative nature of the Gospels so that we can come to **know Jesus instead of just know about him**, and understand better why Matthew tells his story of Jesus the way he does. There will be a number of copies available, or you might consider buying your own copy. The book has the entire text of the Gospel along with Michael Cards comments inviting discussion. **Come share the joy of following Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew, the Gospel of Identity Sundays, 10:30-11:30 AM**.

Communion Assistant Proposal for Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church January 29, 2017

<u>Proposal by the Board of Elders, to be brought forth at a future Voter's meeting</u> We propose to open the service of communion assistants to non-Elder members of the congregation with the following gualifications and conditions -

Lay assistants who assist the pastor with the administration of the sacraments at Shepherd of the Valley shall:

- Be voting members in good standing as defined by bylaws.
- Be selected jointly by Pastor and Elders based on spiritual maturity, individual gifts and desire for service.
- Be supervised and trained by Pastor and Elders. Training to include:
 - Study of and agreement with the Lutheran understanding of the Sacrament of Holy Communion and of the Liturgy of the Sacrament.
 - Procedural training in communion assistance practices.
 - Training references: Lutheran Catechisms, Lutheran Service Book, and the resources available on LCMS.org (the synod website).

Rationale:

- The Pastor is the person *called by the congregation* to administer the sacraments. As such, he fully exercises the role of officiant in the office of public ministry to lead and preside at the celebration of the Holy Sacraments (Baptism & Holy Communion)
- The Pastor leads the Service of the Sacrament, consecrates the elements (bread & wine) with the words of institution and supports and encourages lay assistants on behalf of the congregation.
- The ministry of assisting the Pastor with the administration of the sacraments is an important and valued area of service that brings joy to those who serve and is a blessing to the whole congregation.
- Lay assistants are enlisted to assist in communion distribution to make it an orderly and efficient process. Communion assistance is an act of service that is made available to all members with these gifts.
- To maintain reverence and understanding of the Sacrament, training is provided for lay assistants and assistants are prayerfully chosen by Pastor and Elders to serve.
